

# LOOK



**to look at** – to see intentionally, it usually doesn't move or change  
*I **looked at** the book.*  
*We didn't **get a good look** at the new school.*



**to watch** – to look at something that moves or changes  
*I want to **watch** TV, but not sport.*



**to study** – to look carefully  
*He **studied** the crack in the wall.*



**to stare at** – to look hard for along time  
*'It's rude to **stare,**' my mother always said.*



**to peep at / to peek at** –  
to look quickly, secretly  
*He **peeped into** the room to  
see who was there.  
Let me **have a peek**.*



**to glare at** – to look  
angrily  
*She **glared at** the man.  
She **gave him a terrible  
glare**.*



**to glimpse at** – to see  
briefly and not very well  
*We **glimpsed at** the town  
from the train.  
I only **got a glimpse of** the  
car.*



**to glance at** – to look  
quickly then look away  
*She **glanced back at** me  
as she passed.  
The men exchanged quick  
**glances** in the office.*



**to gaze at** – to look for a long time, often with admiration  
*She **gazed** into his eyes.*



**to gawk at** – to look openly and rudely  
*The man **gawked at** the pretty girl as she passed.*



**to gape at** – to look with surprise, often with your mouth open  
*The children **gaped** as the monkey performed its tricks.*



**to frown at** – to look worried, disapproving or in disagreement - your eyebrows move together.  
*The priest **frowned** when I sneezed in church.*



**to peer at** – to look with some difficulty  
*The man **peered at** me through his thick glasses.*



**to leer at** - to look with hate or mockery  
*She **leered at** the man and pointed the gun.*
